Property Tax Information

Property taxes are due May 1st, 2017. Grace period is 10 days. After May 10th, interest will revert back to May 1. For your convenience, a dropbox is located curbside by main entrance of Library. You may also pay online at www.montvale.org. Homestead Rebate/Credits will be applied to your May taxes. Eligible recipients will receive a revised tax bill in the next coming weeks.

Remember your local volunteers. Mayor's Message



In times when many companies downsize, merge and leave town, KPMG decided to double down and expand right here in Montvale. We can't be any happier to extend the welcome mat to KPMG, their employees, and to their clients visiting our town. This month KPMG held their ground breaking ceremony and work is now in progress on their new building at 75 Chestnut Ridge Road.

We also held a business breakfast this month to learn from our current corporations in town on how we can help them to succeed and prosper in town. A major issue is transportation. We don't have a train that comes to town before 9:30 am and New Jersey Transit hasn't been cooperative with rearranging the schedule. Another issue is access to a meeting space and a local conference center.

The Budget Introduction will be held on March 28th with the Public Hearing on April 25th. Residents are encouraged to attend. The Council diligently analyzed and discussed spending and revenue for 2017. We will be spending close to a million dollars on road paving and maintenance. The Governing Body will be discussing the proposed replacement of a new turf for the Fieldstone Middle School soccer field.

The old pool is being transformed to a field for now and the Council will soon be deciding on what to be built or installed there. For now, however, it is going to remain a grass field maintained by the Borough.

With Spring arriving, new potholes will start to appear. Let us know so our PVDPW can get them repaired timely.

Office of Emergency Management

The Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (R.A.C.E.S.) was created by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). Working in conjunction with the local Office of Emergency Management, members of R.A.C.É.S. assist with radio communications in the event of local, regional or national civil emergencies such as hurricanes, earthquakes, floods or wildfires. Twice a month the Bergen County Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (B.C.R.A.C.E.S) conducts a net to simulate a county wide communications emergency. During this net, many of the towns in Bergen County including Montvale "check-in" via amateur radio and the county keeps track of who attends.



On Wednesday, March 8th, Montvale was responsible for running the Bergen County R.A.C.E.S Net from our Emergency Operation Center at Boro Hall! This was the first time Montvale has ever done this and it shows the confidence that the County has in our OEM/R.A.C.E.S program. Public Works Pothole Information

No one likes them. They seem to pop up overnight. In reality, potholes are created in a number of ways. When water seeps into cracks on the road's surface and is combined with the vibration of traffic it causes the asphalt to fail. This is why there are more potholes after it rains. Potholes are also created when trucks and buses stress the roadway causing a movement of the subsurface. Once there is a weak spot, every car that travels over it worsens the problem, and eventually a section of the material will fail. The most common cause is the freeze/thaw cycle. The ice/snow melts during the day filling cracks with water. At night the water freezes and expands, popping out the asphalt.

Montvale.org or call the Pascack Valley Department of Public Works @ 201 664-2346 X 1400. All municipals roads are done through the Department of Public Works. The Department of Public Works will report all potholes on county roads to the Bergen County Road Department.



Construction Department

As many residents may be aware, the issue of a tree removal ordinance has been discussed for many years. There are certainly arguments for and against such an ordinance. But in the absence of any such ordinance, my office continues to come across problems, miscommunications, and unforeseen expenses that negatively impact the property owner.

In an effort to assist property owners and eliminate these problems, my department will be requiring, effective immediately, a Tree Removal Review form to be submitted to the building department as part of the building application file. This will apply to additions, exterior alterations, decks, patios, and general site cleanup & clearing.

This review form is available online at the borough website. It is NOT a permit and there is no fee for this review. The purpose is to allow the building department to conduct a review of proposed tree removal and alert the homeowner of any additional expenses they may incur due to the removal of tree(s). The removal of large trees or a large number of small trees and the associated stumps can result in extensive soil disturbance which may trigger the need for a soil conservation permit from the county, an engineered regrading plan, a soil movement permit from the borough, or all of these. This can translate into additional costs and project delays to the property owner.



We know very well how unanticipated expenses can impact a project and this is one way we can provide assistance to the property owner and improve the lines of communication from our office. As we get into the warmer weather, we will begin to see an increase in the number of permits for exterior work. This will give us almost all of 2017 to assess the effectiveness of the review program and make any changes that may be needed. We appreciate your cooperation and feedback, good or bad.
